Wolves kill hound above Clearwater

A veteran Idaho County hound hunter lost his best dog to wolves last week while chasing bobcat in the hills east of Clearwater.

Bob Jackson, 64, of Battle Ridge said wolves killed and were in the process of eating a 2½-year-old hound after the dog treed a bobcat about four miles east of Clearwater.

"Luckily, we got there before they had him all eaten up. They spooked off and left," Jackson said. He said his other dogs managed to avoid the wolves because they had lost the bobcat's trail.

"The rest turned around and they

trailed backwards," Jackson added. "So I lost the only good dog in the bunch."

As a veteran 50-year hound hunter, Jackson said the best dogs are often the most vulnerable due to the fact their skills keep them in the woods for longer periods of time.

He said coincidentally, wolves also killed the hound's father the summer the pup was born. "It makes it awful hard to keep good bloodlines going," Jackson said. "I don't know what we're going to do."

Federal trappers have documented and confirmed both kills thereby elimi-

nating any doubt.

In the latest case, Jackson said the wolves had ripped off the hide, ate the liver and began consuming the dog until he arrived at the scene.

Jackson, who was born and raised here, said he has been hunting with hounds since age 14. The wolf is now having a great impact on his way of life.

"Wolves come in frequently and hang out here all the time," he said. "We don't need this kind of problem. We live here so we can enjoy the out-of-doors. This is ridiculous."

A wolf attempted to bring down a yearling elk right below my house in the meadow. And another wolf-killed elk near someone's house on the other side of the hill from us. All of this wolf activity is unacceptable in our township. Call the governor's office at 334-2100 and ask him to implement the bill he signed to declare a state of emergency. This is very important. The wolves have driven the elk right into town (see photo). Some people may think this is neat but the wolves are right on their tail and more will be seen in town. I've talked to several people that used to feel free to take walks but not any more what with this activity in so close. Remember, the threat is not only from wolf attacks but also from the disease they carry.

Remember to stop and sign the petition dealing with the wolf epidemic. Copies are located around town. Then come by the hotel and record your sighting/encounter/attack/loss. Photographs of these events are encouraged.
